Dear Families:

With my first full year as your Superintendent nearing completion, I am pleased with the progress we are making. Your overwhelming and continual support to our children and school district is apparent. As a graduate, resident and your neighbor, I continually and carefully balance the needs of our students, while being fiscally responsible to you, our community.

Our proposed school district budget for the 2019-2020 school year is \$57,438,809. This budget is tax cap compliant. In fact, the increase to the tax levy is 5% below the amount permitted under tax cap legislation. After careful consultation and review with you the community, our teachers, administrators, support staff, and Board of Education, this proposed budget allows us to provide much needed support in the following areas: an additional ENL teacher (English as a New Language), a Minority Group Specialist (Community Liaison), an increase to our music and speech offerings/supports for the Middle and High School Campus, while increasing our contractual bus fleet by two more buses. Additionally, Truman and Martin Road Elementary will no longer be sharing the same bus runs (they will be separated by building) and Truman will have door to door drop-off and pick-up service.

Also, we hope that you have noticed that our buildings and grounds have been open and available in the evenings and weekends to our children and community through various partnerships.

Considering the aforementioned additional supports, please be advised that as a District, we are aware and have heard your thoughts and ideas regarding other new initiatives. We believe that this will allow us to build upon our existing programs, while being fiscally prudent. A major factor that has contributed to allowing our school district to move forward with the new initiatives was our significant increase in our Foundation Aid Funding. We receive a large percentage of our funding from New York State. A portion of our full funding from the state is Foundation Aid, which directly impacts programming.

After the Governor's proposed small increase in Foundation Aid, we strongly advocated to the Senate and Assembly our concerns, needs, and suggestions for our District. They heard us! Personally, I would like to recognize our local leaders, Senator Tim Kennedy and Assembly Members Sean Ryan and Patrick Burke. I would be remiss if I did not mention Senator Shelley Mayer from Yonkers, who is the Senate's Education Chairperson. Without these four state officials and their continued leadership, direction, professionalism, and constant advocacy, we certainly could not have achieved the funding which was provided. These efforts allowed us to limit the burden on you, the local taxpayer. Our elected friends and officials in Albany have helped change the path for our District with this funding!

In closing, I feel that we are fortunate to be part of a community that places such a high value on investing in our students and schools. We are shaping our youth, who will be our future leaders. 

PROJECTED REVENUES




